INTERFAITH HOSPITALITY NETWORK

A Community Response to Homeless Families

What: IHN of Johnson City consists of congregations joining together to provide lodging, meals, and assistance to homeless families in our community.

Where: Each "host" congregation provides overnight accommodations and meals for three to five families for one week three to four times a year. Support congregations are paired with host congregations to provide volunteers and other forms of support to the host church. Homeless families, referred to as "guests" stay at the host church from 5:30 pm to 7:00 am daily for the week. Guests are transported each morning to the Day Center where there are showers, laundry facilities, telephones, computers, and a large play area for children. There the IHN staff connects families with a wide variety of community resources and services that assist in pursuit of living independently. Each family works on their specific plan and objectives, including such issues as employment, housing, counseling, education, skills training, health and nutrition, parenting, and more.

How: Every morning guests are transported to the Day Center and are returned to the host church each evening. Volunteers prepare and serve an evening meal and offer fellowship. Two volunteers remain at the church overnight with the guests.

Who: Social Services agencies help screen and refer families. Those with active substance abuse or psychiatric problems are excluded, but referred elsewhere for treatment.

Why: Homelessness touches virtually every city and town in our country. Hundreds of thousands of American children and adults are homeless. Over 12% of the U. S. population lives in poverty, one in 6 children. Over half of the homeless are women and children. Families are the fastest growing segment of the homeless demographic.. The reasons are many—lack of affordable housing, jobs that pay low wages and minimum benefits, high cost of child care and health care, inaccessible public transportation, major illness, auto accidents, divorce. In the surrounding 8-county area, a 24-hr. survey in 2005 revealed 522 homeless persons, 275 in Washington County. IHN is the only program in Johnson City that provides comprehensive services and keeps families together during their homelessness. IHN fills a broad gap in service

delivery to homeless families with children. Many are not able to reside in other shelters because of the make-up of the family. Other shelters are not equipped to offer the home-like environment and supportive nature of IHN.
